The Community Foundation of Hancock County (CFHC) functions with a mindset of constant gratitude since the work we do is made possible by an incredibly generous community. 



illuminating Safety: Firefly's Mission for Stronger Families

Firefly Children & Family Alliance is the largest child abuse prevention provider in central Indiana. A \$5,000 grant from CFHC helped Firefly partner with local fire departments to host an ongoing Booster Bash program throughout 2023. This initiative seeks to distribute car and booster seats to families in need while providing essential car seat safety checks—a vital service that has seen increased demand with fewer hospitals and community agencies addressing this pressing need.

This program is one aspect of the Community Partners for Child Safety (CPCS) program, which provides in-home assessments and case management to help families achieve self-sufficiency and prevent child abuse and neglect. Last year alone, Firefly served more than 230 individuals and families in Hancock County, with a remarkable 97% success rate in keeping families out of the child welfare system.

The goal is to prevent common childhood accidents and injuries, as highlighted by the Indiana Child Fatality Review team's estimation that over 77% of child fatalities are preventable. With the ongoing challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic, access to necessary safety education and materials has become increasingly critical.

In the summer of 2023, Firefly collaborated with various organizations, including Hancock4Kids and the City of Greenfield, to host a series of impactful events. These included the Superhero 5K, aimed at promoting safety for both adults and children, and the Family Fun in the Park Series, which featured engaging activities alongside crucial safety education.

Additionally, the Community Night Out event at the Hancock County Fairgrounds brings together local law enforcement, healthcare providers, and community organizations that provided essential safety resources and information to approximately 3,000 adults and children.

Wheels of Hope: Keeping the Community Connected

The Landing Place operates a bus that provides transportation to students from schools, homes, and local nonprofits to benefit from The Landing's programming and then returns them home safely. The goal is to remove the transportation barrier for those seeking meetings, coaching, and programming that provides tools to achieve a healthier lifestyle.

The mission of The Landing Place is to be a safe place where all people can learn recovery tools to navigate from and learn more about substance abuse, mental health, trauma, and general life issues. In 2023, The Landing served approximately 2,000 youth.

The Community Foundation provided a \$10,000 grant to perform needed maintenance on the aging bus to extend its useful life and maintain safety for the riders. This includes oil changes and tire and brake check-ups and new windows. Funds also went toward insurance and a stipend for the driver.

On Wednesday nights, the bus picks up about 12-17 students ages 12-19 for The Landing program – a safe place to connect and build healthy relationships. On Monday nights, it extends its mission even further, welcoming students 18 and older for rides to the Recovery Café.

Empowering Hancock County Youth

The Student Counseling Assistance Program (SCAP), a program designed by Mental Health Partners (MHP) of Hancock County to champion the mental health and well-being of our community's youth was launched in 2023. SCAP offers hope, providing crucial financial support for mental health counseling to young residents of Hancock County, from birth to age 21.

The need for such a program has never been more apparent. Recent statistics from the State of Indiana highlight a distressing trend: 10% of Indiana high school students have attempted suicide one or more times during the last 12 months, with nearby Howard County experiencing the highest rate of student suicide deaths in the state. Given the similar demographics of Howard and Hancock counties, this issue is not just a statistic—it's a pressing local concern.

Recognizing that early intervention is key to altering the trajectory of mental health struggles, SCAP seeks to ensure that every young person, regardless of their schooling environment, has access to professional mental health care. While Hancock County's public schools do provide access to mental health counselors, SCAP extends its reach to those who may seek more discreet support or attend private schools that lack such resources.

Through SCAP, eligible students can receive funding for up to 10 counseling sessions, with potential extensions to meet individual needs. This program has already begun to change lives. Jane Doe, a 16-year-old beneficiary of SCAP, shared her heartfelt experience: "Without the help from Mental Health Partners, I would have continued to suffer in silence as I knew my parents could not afford to pay for therapy, and I struggled with my depression. I was able to go to therapy finally with the help of them and learn coping skills while building my self-esteem back up."

SCAP not only provides immediate assistance but is also working to dismantle the stigma surrounding mental health. By promoting early intervention, MHP aims to improve outcomes for Hancock County youth and decrease the long-term costs associated with untreated mental health issues.

With this \$9,750 grant, the Community Foundation helped MHP create a supportive environment where every student in Hancock County has the opportunity to thrive, mentally and emotionally.

Bridging the Digital Gap at the Boys & Girls Club

Since 1938, The Boys & Girls Club has been at the forefront of youth development in Hancock County. With the help of a recent \$7,247 grant from the Community Foundation, the club has been able to add technology resources for members to develop 21st Century skills for academics and career.

Robb Reed, Director of Resource Development & Administration, said many of their members in low- to moderate-income households do not have access to reliable internet. Many members in that same population rely mainly on mobile access.

“Lack of technology continues to create a digital divide for our members,” Reed said. “When Clubs have access to robust technology, they are better equipped to help youth reach their full potential.”

This initiative kicked off with the introduction of 15 computers equipped with the latest software, dedicated to enhancing STEM education within the club's walls. This technological boost means that science, technology, engineering, and mathematics are no longer daunting fields for youth but are accessible areas where they can thrive and explore under the guidance of skilled mentors.


The Club aims to be a place where technology enhances lives rather than distracts. Advanced gaming systems and educational tools ensure that technology serves as a tool for growth, helping each child to navigate the digital world safely and confidently.

The vision includes the integration of MyFuture.net, a digital platform that allows members to engage creatively in digital arts, science projects, and more, showcasing their accomplishments and learning new skills in a supportive online community.

Wellspring of Growth: Nameless Creek Camp's Journey Forward

In the beautiful east Hancock County countryside, Nameless Creek Youth Camp (NCYC) stands as a place of growth and opportunity for young minds. Recently NCYC took on a capital improvement aimed at expanding its capacity and impact: the construction of a new well in the northern part of the camp.

This significant project was not just about infrastructure; it's about securing a future where NCYC can continue to serve as a sanctuary for learning, adventure, and empowerment. A \$7,500 grant from the Community Foundation toward the new well will ensure adequate water supply to support expanded facilities and programs that touch the lives of more youth each year.

The scope of the work included the excavation of the well, installation of a modern pump system, and laying down of electrical lines essential for operation. The cost was substantial, but the returns, in terms of community development and youth engagement, are immeasurable.

NCYC is more than just a summer camp. It is a community cornerstone that hosts Boy Scout troops, homeschool groups, and even serves as a local voting center. The expansion means enhanced programs, from nature and science exploration to disaster response training—preparing youth not just to thrive but to lead.

Support has been the cornerstone of NCYC's success. Since beginning their LevelUp grant in 2019 and the growth of their endowment fund, they've seen what the power of community backing can achieve. Looking forward, the new Patron Membership program will open avenues for legacy giving, ensuring that NCYC continues to be a destination for generations.

Hancock County Food Pantry

Sustains Essential Services Amid Growing Demand

As the Hancock County Food Pantry (HCFP) moved to its new facility, continuing its mission to provide essential food supplies to those in need, the demand for services continues to grow. The cost of keeping their shelves stocked has surged. A CFHC grant of \$10,000 helped cover nearly a month of HCFP's food expenses, which now average about \$12,000 monthly due to increased client numbers and rising food costs.

In 2022 alone, HCFP served 1,423 unique households, totaling 7,304 visits throughout the year. The early months of 2023 saw an even sharper rise in clients, escalating the need for additional resources to maintain their level of support for the community. This increase was reflected not only in the volume of those served but also in the inflated costs of food, a challenge they continue to navigate amid economic fluctuations.

The grant was used exclusively to purchase food from Gleaner's Food Bank, ensuring that 100% of the funds were allocated directly to meeting the immediate needs of our community. The pantry's efforts are powered by a dedicated, all-volunteer team, including the board of directors, who are deeply involved in daily operations. From handling financials and managing supplies to participating in shifts and picking up donations across Central Indiana, HCFP board members are hands-on in their commitment to the cause. Their invaluable support and financial contributions reflect their deep commitment to the mission and the community they serve.

This grant helped the Hancock County Food Pantry to not only sustain but enhance their capacity to serve our community, working to ensure no individual or family goes hungry in Hancock County.

Additional Highlights

- 1 Fortville Action Inc. received a \$1,092 grant for parking in downtown, allowing public access to the Alley and the Patio, as well as the rest of downtown Fortville.
- 2 Hancock County Arts was granted \$2,000 for Celebrating Art in Hancock County. The Will Vawter Exhibit will be able to continue and expand on the main exhibit, the annual Will Vawter Art Exhibit and Plein-Air Paint Out. This exhibit's objective is to be a focal point for art and artists in Hancock County.
- 3 Hope House was awarded a grant for \$4,500 that provided 5 laptops for residents to use for filling out applications and resumes.
- 4 FUSE was granted for \$3,400 for new technology that has helped increase their ability to work together to plan programs and activities for families. Accessing files quickly, editing pictures for the website without computer issues and using the new software has been a game changer for them.
- 5 Servants at Work was granted \$10,000 to help facilitate building ramps in the Hancock County area.
- 6 A \$6,000 grant to the CFHC Y-GIVE Youth Philanthropy Board made their service projects such as books for Greenfield Head Start students, Regreening Greenfield, and other team-building endeavors possible.
- 7 The CFHC gifted the Imagination Library Statue to the children of Hancock County in October 2023. It is located near the courthouse annex. It is a gift made possible from a caring community. The value of this grant was \$100,000.
- 8 Poss-Abilities received a \$1,000 grant through the Martha Beckenholdt Youth Philanthropy Award. The recipient of that award, Luke Schilling, chose the program that helps individuals with mental, physical, and emotional disabilities experience what showing an animal is like at the Hancock County 4-H Fair
- 9 KidsPlay received \$1,680 for new stage flat construction and power tools. This will help sustain KidsPlay for many years.
