





the use of their community foundation's resources. Since the GIFT initiative's inception, Lilly Endowment has tried to encourage as many Indiana community foundations as possible to be independent and self-sustaining.

In late 2004, Lilly Endowment announced "Sustaining Resource Development," a program that provided community foundations across Indiana educational opportunities and training in development and fundraising practices. It also encouraged the formulation and implementation of a strategic plan for ongoing development of endowments within each community foundation.

The Hancock County Community Foundation is proud to announce it has been awarded a \$173,000 grant through this visionary program to implement a comprehensive resource development plan. The primary focus of the Community Foundation's three-year strategic plan is to engage Board members, Emeritus Board members, volunteers, and staff members in deliberate and ongoing resource development activities that will steward donors over their lifetime and result in an overall increase in the number of planned gifts, agency endowment funds, donor advised funds, community development funds, and operating endowment funds.

As a part of the strategic resource development plan, the Foundation's Board of Directors has adopted a goal of raising \$1 million in endowment funds before December 31, 2008. Meeting our goal of \$1 million and increasing the awareness and establishment of planned gifts will go a long way in helping the Community Foundation meet its mission of providing philanthropic leadership to effectively manage and direct the resources of donors in ways which enrich and enhance the quality of life in Hancock County. With the focus of our strategic resource development plan being the growth of permanent endowment funds, the staff and board developed a CASE for support to communicate the need to grow the Community Foundation's endowment

CAPE Extension Aids High-tech Education Article excerpted from June 21, 2005 Daily Reporter.

In 2005 Hancock County's public schools and the Hancock County Public Library received more money from Lilly Endowment to build on innova-

tive programs they started with the help of the endowment four years ago.

The county's schools, libraries and the Alliance for Community Education

previously received \$4.9 million from the Community Alliances to Promote Education program (CAPE). Those grant dollars have been used to establish a number of high-tech educational programs—everything from remediation software for elementary school students at Southern Hancock to funding an all-fiber optic network to link all of the entities.

While this newest grant isn't as large, it will help the schools, the public library and ACE sustain the programs they began with the original grant. "When we applied for the first grant, we focused on the 21st century learning culture," said John Carreon. "We used the money to focus on technology and infrastructure improvements and (CAPE III) will continue that effort."

The original grant made possible a high-tech academy at Mt. Vernon that brought professional computer training and certifications to high school students. Eastern Hancock set up a high-tech agricultural program. It also helped pay for the library's Techmobile and helped reorganize the Alliance for Community Education.

John Carreon said that Mt. Vernon's high-tech academy will receive some of the money over the next three years as the salaries of the instructors are absorbed by the school system. ACE will benefit from some

strategic planning to help bring it to self-sufficiency. The electronic tutoring program started at the Southern Hancock schools—known as PLATO— will soon be expanded to the other school systems.

"There is no way we could have afforded PLATO in all of the schools, but thanks to the fiber optic network, students in all of the schools can access the software," Carreon said. At Eastern Hancock, the high-tech ag program will expand thanks to the grant and a partnership with Purdue University. "They will be partnering with Purdue to develop a life-sciences academy at Eastern that will be available to all students in the county, just like the high-tech academy at Mt. Vernon," Carreon said.

An application for the CAPE III grant was filed to help the schools and the public library continue and to expand the exploration of new areas in which to use the high-tech programs funded by the original CAPE grant.

"We have some extraordinary programs going on in all of the schools that partner them together which is very unique in Indiana. There are only a few high schools accepted into Purdue's life sciences initiative and very few counties have programs housed in different schools open to students from neighboring school systems," said Carreon. "It was part of the strength of our application."

The 2005 Annual Celebration Event sported a musical feel, as we joined friends and neighbors to celebrate and sing the praises of our giving community. Over 150 wonderful donors, grantees, board members, corporate partners, and community members were able to join us for a celebration of generosity and the impact it has made in Hancock County. The festivities took place on November 15 at Park Chapel Christian Church beginning at 11:30 A.M. with a delicious luncheon.

The Hancock County Community Foundation has been privileged to serve donors as an instrument that provides them the melody needed to produce record breaking, positive change through grants and scholarships. Because of our donor's generosity, we rejoice in the fact that, in 2005, more than \$44,000 dollars in community development grants addressed needs in the areas of education, health and human services, youth and civic issues, and arts and culture. More than 75 Hancock County students received scholarships totaling over \$90,000. In addition, Foundation assets total over \$11 million dollars allowing donors to collectively make tremendous impact now and forever. Now that's something to sing about!

Festivities of the day included singing the praises of Martha Beckenholdt

through the presentation of the Youth Philanthropy Award given in her honor. Jordan Conley was the worthy recipient of this award. He, in turn, chose Edelweiss Equine

Assisted Therapy as the recipient of a \$500 grant. The event hit another high note with the presentation of the Emeritus Leadership Award to Hancock County Senior Services for the outstanding leadership role they have played in the development of the Hancock County Area Transit program.

In addition, David Spencer, Sales and Public Relations Manager for Hancock Telecom, conducted a presentation around the creation and implementation of the Hancock Telecom's Ray of Light Endowment Fund. The purpose of this endowment fund is to assist in the positive moral, social, and psychological development and growth of Hancock County and its citizens by supporting projects and programs of nonprofit organizations. "The creation and continued gifting to the Ray of Light Endowment Fund allows our company to give back to the very communities we serve. We believe a ris-

ing tide lifts all ships and our ability to help provide grant dollars to nonprofit organizations who are working to make our communities better places is good for all of us," said David Spencer.

The day ended with a crescendo of philanthropic activity. Attendees were given fresh, new \$10 bills and asked to use these dollars to make a difference in the community. A special reporting tool was placed on the Foundation website to give our guests an opportunity to share their giving experiences. The primary purpose of this exercise was to promote the behavior of charitable giving. Over the following couple of months, the Foundation received over 50 responses relating how guests used their \$10 bills. Some of the causes

that were supported included Special Olympics and the Food Pantry. In addition, almost eighty percent (80%) of the guests who responded indicated they gave additional dollars to the cause they supported. "One of the projects our office sponsors with others is a GED class with free childcare for those

mothers who need the care while they attend weekly classes. For the current class, we have 5 mothers who will be taking the test next week. One mother could not come up with the \$60 fee. She will provide part of it, the Literacy Coalition will provide part of it,

and I added another \$10 to the \$10 I received at your celebration luncheon to cover her full fee. Thanks for making this gift possible," said Judy Ingerman with Healthy Families.

Hancock County Public Library Capital Campaign

In 2004, the Hancock County Public Library (HCPL) came to the Foundation with a request. Would HCCF be willing to assist the Library in its new capital campaign? After discovering the requirements and goals of the campaign, it became apparent that a collaborative effort would serve the interests of both the Library and the Foundation. The Foundation would receive gifts on behalf of the Library, acknowledge the gifts, and keep track of financial information. The Library would also accept gifts, if necessary, but its main focus would be on determining and fulfilling the needs of the Library that were not covered in the building budget, e.g. furnishings, new equipment and software for technology needs, and landscaping. HCPL established a pass-through fund for donors to contribute to as they showed their support for the Library's goals.

The Hancock County Community Foundation is best known for its endowment funds, where gifts are permanently invested with only a portion of the earnings paid out each year. However, there is alternative that may also serve community needs. A passthrough fund allows all donations to be spent for the purpose of the fund. The donations are 'passed through' the Foundation to benefit the founding contributor's charitable purpose, in this case the library's capital campaign.

The Hancock County Community Foundation has been pleased to help with this successful capital campaign. This HCPL initiative drew support from all walks of life – companies and businesses, families and individuals, current residents and former community members. Pledges and one time gifts from these donors filled the mailbox at the Foundation. The Library's brick campaign proved to be very popular with over 330 bricks purchased as donors chose to honor or memorialize

loved ones. Due to the generosity of this community, the Library has raised \$550,000 toward its \$600,000 goal. All of these donations have been transferred directly to the library to cover the costs associated with the furnishings, including a new aquarium, the technology needs, and the landscaping of the facility at its new site.

Dianne Osborne, Executive Director of HCPL, states, "Having the Community Foundation as a resource for this campaign proved to be

very beneficial to the library. The Foundation is set up to receive gifts and administer them efficiently. By working together on this new campaign, our donors have been pleased with the giving process, and the library has been allowed to concentrate on the many issues it has faced during the construction and transition process. I appreciate the Foundation's willingness to work with us over the course of this multi-year campaign."

John C. Beeson Humanitarian Endowment Fund

Karen Beeson, a longtime donor to the Hancock County Community Foundation, had very special reasons for creating this endowment fund and has a very special plan for the way her family will be involved with this fund over time. The John C. Beeson Humanitarian Endowment Fund was established in memory of her son, John. Mrs. Beeson tells us, "He was a man of God with a tender heart – especially toward

those less fortunate than he. I feel that this type of fund would carry out his desires in a tangible and positive manner." A donor advised fund was set up whereby Ms. Beeson and her family would help determine the fund's nonprofit recipient annually. The purpose of this fund is to benefit those who have suffered catastrophic events, illness, or accident, the underprivileged, mentally or physically impaired, abused, battered, and neglected individuals or families. This intent was important to Mrs. Beeson because she believes that John would have been pleased with its focus and that this fund has the capability to really address the needs of people in our community. "My family believes that, regardless of plight, all people have value. We want to recognize that value."

Ms. Beeson learned from her father, Maynard Brown, the importance of understanding the needs of the less fortunate. She is encouraging her daughters also to follow that path. By including these family members as advisors, not only will they learn how an endowment fund works, they will have the gratification that comes from knowing they have helped to make a positive impact on the lives of others, in John's memory. Thus, a special legacy will be passed from one generation to the next.

Community Philanthropy Awards

2005 Emeritus Leadership Award

The Hancock County Community Foundation was honored to name Hancock County Senior Services, Inc. as the recipient of its 2005 Hancock County Community Foundation Emeritus Leadership Award.

In 2001, the Hancock County Community Foundation Board of Directors established the Hancock County Community Foundation Emeritus Board. The Emeritus Board recognizes and continues to engage those past Board members who completed at least one full three-year term as a Board member.

The purpose of the Hancock County Community Foundation Emeritus Leadership Award is to honor Emeritus Board members by having them recognize a Hancock County nonprofit organization that has exhibited the same outstanding leadership in the nonprofit sector as they did as Community Foundation Board members. Specifically, this award is intended to celebrate and reward a Hancock County nonprofit organization that has displayed outstanding community leadership in addressing the needs of its constituencies.

The reason the award was given to Hancock County Senior Services is that they have done an incredible job of addressing issues surrounding public transportation throughout Hancock County through their Hancock Area

Rural Transit (HART) program.

there was no public transportation available in Hancock County for residents. Immediately, Senior Services provided transportation for residents over the age of 60. In 1992, the Board of Senior Services approved including disabled residents who were under 60 years of age in the transportation program. Even with numerous attempts by Senior Services and various other entities, the vital need of public transportation continued to be unfilled. It was recognized when Senior Services was formed, that the lack of transportation placed an extra burden not only on the elderly but also on the low income residents of the community. Two gaps in service continued. First, resources did not fulfill the need for seniors and the disabled. Second, anyone under 60 years of age who was not disabled could not be served. With the creation of the Hancock Area Rural Transit (HART) program in 2005, both of these gaps in service have begun to be addressed.

2005 Martha Beckenholdt Youth Philanthropy Award

The Martha Beckenholdt Youth Philanthropy award was established by the Hancock County Community Foundation in 1996. This award is given annually to a junior from one of the four Hancock County high schools, who exhibits outstanding contributions of time, talent, and energy to philanthropic endeavors. An unrestricted grant is made by the Community Foundation, in the recipient's name, to a nonprofit of the student's choice.

The Hancock County Community Foundation was Martha Beckenholdt. pleased to announce Jordan Conley as the winner of the 2005 Martha Beckenholdt Youth Philanthropy Award. Jordan is the son of Jeff and Janice Conley. He is involved in FFA, 4-H, and is employed at Smith Implements. Jordan selected Edelweiss Equine Assisted Therapy Center as the nonprofit to receive the unrestricted grant in his name.

Jordan has dedicated many volunteer hours to Edelweiss, fulfilling the desire of Ms. Beckenholdt and HCCF to perpetuate philanthropy from one generation to the next. "It is impossible for me to put on paper the immense impact that Jordan has made at Edelweiss. He was one of the first people to volunteer when that facility opened in 2004. He has spent numerous hours, over 100 in fact, assisting in classes as a horse handler. Jordan works well with the horses, but more importantly is a great role model for the riders. Edelweiss has very few young men that volunteer during classes, yet the rider population is 75% male. Having Jordan as a volunteer gives our riders someone to look up to and admire. One rider calls Jordan 'right hand man.' That rider goes on to write, in a letter to our Executive Director, that Jordan has taught him everything he knows about grooming and riding horses. I know for a fact that Jordan has given this young rider a level of achievement to strive for and makes his time at Edelweiss the most fun possible," said Elisa Bowen Bell, Founder of Edelweiss.

Edelweiss is a nonprofit organization that offers a therapeutic horseback riding program for children and adults who are mentally, physically, socially, behaviorally, and emotionally challenged. It's goal is to enhance the physical, mental, and psychological benefits through riding and learning about horses.

After interviewing Jordan, the selection committee thought it should please Ms. Beckenholdt to know that our community is in such good hands.

2005 Community Development Grants

Enriching Enhancing Life through **Philanthropy**

The Hancock County Community Foundation is a vehicle to be utilized in helping to build a better community. The Foundation is a collection of charitable endowment funds that caring people and organizations have established to meet the diverse needs of our citizens. Our donors have entrusted the Foundation to invest their money wisely, administer their funds efficiently, and provide grants to assist nonprofit agencies in carrying out their missions. To these ends, the mission of the Foundation is to provide philanthropic leadership to effectively manage and direct the resources of donors in ways which enrich and enhance the quality of life in Hancock County.

Most important to the Foundation's mission is our ability to utilize the philanthropic resources given by donors to enhance our ability to provide needed grant dollars. The Community Foundation funded programs addressing issues that support equine therapy for disabled children, domestic violence programs, and helping the restoration of an arts center through the administration of Community Development grants. The following is a listing of those programs that were funded during 2005:

Alternatives, Inc.

HCCF provided financial support to complete a new domestic violence

The Arc of Hancock County

This grant provided funding to the Arc for its Discovery Camp, an inclusive camp which took place at Edelweiss Equine Assisted Therapy Center, for children some of whom may have developmental delays and physical disabilities. Campers of all ages and abilities did crafts, rode and groomed horses, and learned how to care for animals.

Edelweiss Equine Assisted Therapy Center, Inc.

Edelweiss continued its important therapeutic work for children and adults with special needs through an expansion program. These HCCF grant dollars were matched to create even greater impact on Edelweiss programs.

Greenfield-Central Community Schools—Elementary Level

Obesity has been identified as a major factor in health-related illnesses. This grant helped fund Fitness for Kids!, an after-school physical activity and nutrition program that teaches nutrition, provides a platform for regular exercise, and is open to third grade students.

"The Community Foundation has been a great resource for us to jump start new programs we may not have been able to establish otherwise. Once established, we have been able to maintain those programs with other funding. For a small organization like ours, this type of start-up support is instrumental in helping us grow and meet the needs of our members."

Greenfield-Community Schools-Middle School Level

Students flourish academically when they read. They also have fewer suspensions, fewer expulsions, and experience a reduction in school violence. With these funds, Greenfield Middle School purchased books. Their goal...to increase the average number of books read by the 8th grade class from 2.8 per semester to 5.

Hancock County Senior Services

HCCF, together with Eli Lilly and Company, has provided the funding needed to match the 5310 capital projects transportation grant awarded to Senior Services. With these dollars, they purchased a much needed wheelchair van to further expand their transportation services to county residents.

Hancock County Visitors Bureau

Once again, the Foundation has provided funding to help advance the establishment of an arts center in Hancock County. The Village Theatre Restoration project is well underway.

Love INC

HCCF granted start up funding for this new organization which is making a huge impact on Hancock County residents through their Clearinghouse operation. How does it work? Someone in need contacts Love INC and their office staff works with local agencies and church volunteers to help match and fill that need.

The Boys and Girls Club of Hancock County

The Boys and Girls Club is touching the lives of children in all corners

of Hancock County. These funds have been utilized to support the Shirley Outreach Program serving children in the Wilkinson and Shirley area by providing much needed after-school activities.

The SADD Chapter of Eastern Hancock

SADD is an Eastern Hancock student organization that addresses the issues of smoking, drinking, drugs, HIV, and bullying, as well as buckle safety, prom promise, and friendship. This active organization received the high honor of Indiana SADD Chapter

of the Year and SADD Student of the Year in its first year of inception, 2004/2005. These funds have allowed them to expand their education efforts in the coming school year.

Family Service

Family Service receives inquiries on a frequent basis for anger management services from employers and law enforcement personnel in Hancock County. In response, they have used grant dollars to serve persons whose anger has caused unmanageable conflict in the home, workplace, or community.

Fortville Skate Park

Volunteer parents in the city of Fortville have worked diligently with the Parks Department to create a safe place for young people to skate. The park provides an active lifestyle for youth in a positive way and keeps skaters off the streets and places of business. The Park is now hosting skate competitions that bring business to local restaurants and shops. The grant has been used for additional equipment.

Hancock Regional Hospital

The hospital is reaching out to the community with their Health Ministries program. In so doing, team members provide informative health sessions and education pieces on various topics through their places of worship. This grant provided funding for the training of a parish nurse.

KidsPlay, Inc.

A cast of 25 actors and 10 dancers in grades 3-8 from Hancock County dazzled the community with "The Little Town of Christmas" on December 2, 3, and 4. This grant covered the expense of royalties for the production.

NASA

With this grant, Neighborhoods Against Substance Abuse expanded its efforts in education with a new program, "Helping Teens Overcome Problems with Alcohol, Marijuana, and Other Drugs." The class is available to the youth of Hancock County who have been cited for a violation regarding alcohol and/or other drugs as well as youth asked to attend by concerned parents, guardians, and school personnel.

P.A.W.S.

P.A.W.S. has many facets to its programs, but teaching children respect for all living things while meeting Indiana's Academic Standards is a real focus. In addition, P.A.W.S provides a program called HELP which provides transportation to elder/handicapped residents who have no other way to transport their animals. The Pet Food Pantry takes in donated food and distributes it to individuals in Hancock County who are experiencing financial difficulties. Grant funding was applied to the purchase of a van to be used in furthering these programs.

New Palestine High School

Project Lead the Way is designed to attract students to the field of engineering as well as better prepare them for college engineering programs. NPHS has partnered with Purdue for this innovative program. Funding allowed the purchase of additional high-tech equipment.

Special Olympics of Hancock County

Operation Basketball will provide persons with mental and developmental disabilities the opportunity to participate in basketball practices and games right here in Hancock County. Prior to receiving this grant, travel outside the county was required though difficult for those with disabilities. This grant was used to purchase a score board, basketballs, and to support the facility rental for games.

Agency Endowment Funds

Within the Hancock County Community Foundation, a nonprofit agency or organization can create an endowment fund from which it will receive annual income. Notes to Financial Statements
For the Years Ended December 31, 2005 and 2004

A. Summary of Significant Accounting Practices

Accounting Basis. The Organization reports information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets. The accompanying financial statements have been prepared from the books, records and reports of Hancock County Community Foundation, Inc.

Fixed Assets. Real estate, property and equipment additions are valued at cost, which does not purport to represent replacement or realizable values. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful life of the asset.

Net Assets. Temporarily restricted assets are only temporarily a part of the Foundation and are redistributed when certain conditions are met. Endowment assets are permanent assets of the Foundation and only the income may be distributed. In certain cases the endowments are designated by a single donor or by an agency and the net earnings of these assets are distributed annually to the designated beneficiary institution.

Income Taxes. Hancock County Community Foundation, Inc. is a private, non-profit corporation, incorporated under the Indiana General Not-for-Profit Corporation Act and is exempt from Federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. It is also exempt from Indiana franchise or income tax.

Use of Estimates. In preparing financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles, management is required to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and revenues and expenses during the reported period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

B. Temporarily Restricted Assets

On September 9, 2004, the Foundation entered into an agreement to Administer and track funds raised by and on behalf of the Hancock County Public Library capital fundraising campaign. These funds are to cover the costs associated with the physical construction and furnishing of a main branch library facility. The Foundation is to retain any investment income earned from these funds plus two (2) percent of the total funds contributed as compensation for the services rendered
